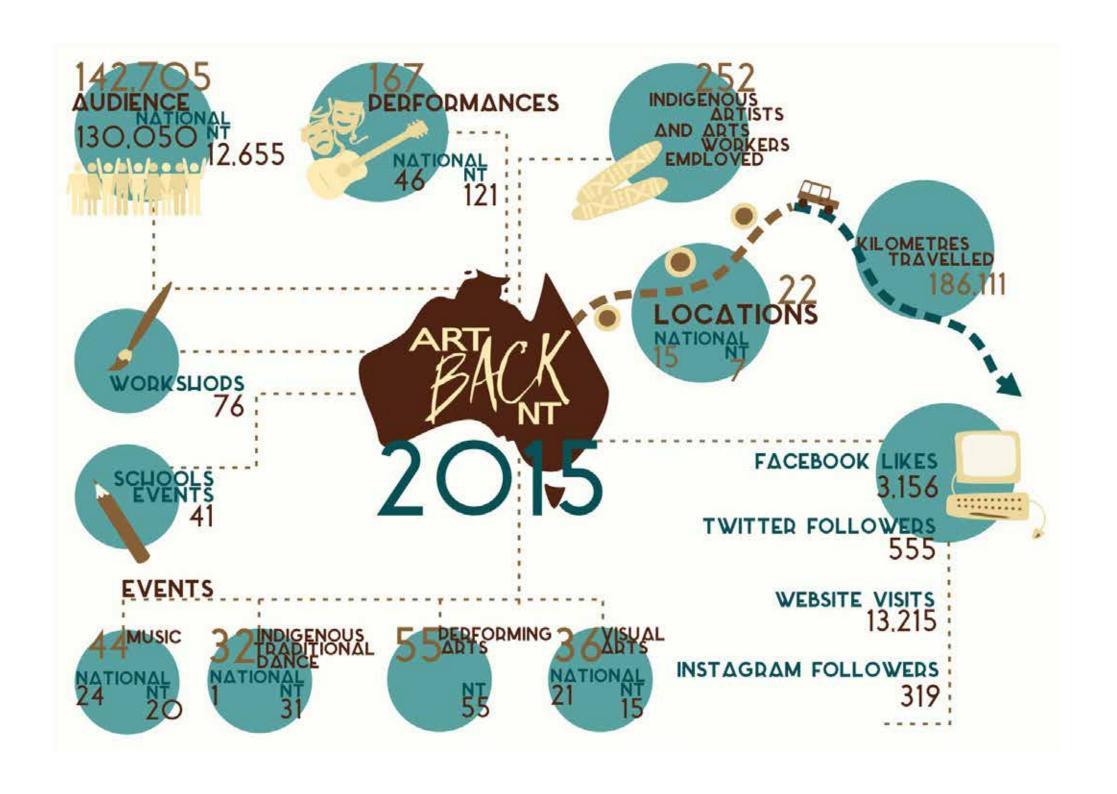

CHAIR'S REPORT

As the Northern Territory's development and touring organisation, Artback NT promotes Territory talent within the Territory and nationwide. A glance at our website, our productivity and delivery statistics and recent annual reports will testify to the variety, volume and high standard of events this multi-art form organisation manages to develop and produce each year. Throughout 2015 alone, 121 programs, events and workshops were delivered within the Territory, and 46 high quality events toured to national venues, reaching an audience totalling 142,705 Australia wide

Too rarely do we stop and reflect on the fact this is achieved across three offices by a staff of eightonly two of whom are full time-making Artback NT's achievements all the more remarkable. Even more impressive is what this dedicated and talented team managed to produce in 2015 while having to contend with the unforeseen challenge of serious financial constraints imposed by the Federal Government's untimely cuts to the Australia Council -one of our major funding bodies. Needless to say these cuts severely curtailed Artback NT's activity, creating uncertainty in ongoing program presentation and employment insecurity for our staff. On behalf of the board I would like to thank our dedicated and dynamic team at Artback NT for the professional manner in which they handled this disruption and remained committed to bringing to life a broad and inspiring range of programs. The success of this organisation is a result of their loyalty and their passion for the projects they deliver. I thank my fellow board members for their good governance and support during this testing time, constantly providing insightful advice to ensure the sustainability of our organisation.

The impact of funding cuts, both Federal and Territory, on small-to-medium organisations such as Artback NT, highlights the tenuous nature of government funding and the necessity of securing patronage from other sectors, particularly partnerships, sponsorship and philanthropic support. The competition for such funding in this current economic climate emphasises the need to develop alternative strategic incomegeneration activities. This is an area the board is committed to addressing, along with taking a proactive approach in increasing awareness of our organisation's abilities and broadening our national and international profile.

In 2015, lack of funding resulted in the loss of our successful Music Touring program and a valued member of staff, Music Touring Manager, Vanessa Hutchins. Another priority for the board is to ensure the benefits of this program are recognised and dedicated funding is secured to restore the program and maintain its long-term viability.

Thank you to the staff and board for the time and effort all gave to fine-tuning our impressive 2016-2020 Strategic Plan and the eye-catching and inspiring Capacity Statement, which can be found on our website. These documents reflect the energy, diversity and innovation of Artback NT.

I leave it to our most capable Executive Officer to outline the achievements, individual efforts and future endeavours of our dynamic organisation and look forward to a year which promises to provide the exciting, high quality programs and events that Artback NT so regularly and successfully delivers.

TREASURER'S REPORT

2015 was a challenging year for most regional/community based arts organisations in this country and Artback NT saw a drop in income from the previous twelve months of more than \$1 million dollars.

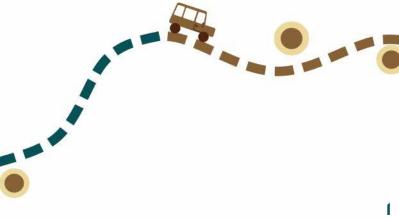
Total income for 2015 was \$1,945,670.64. The organisation recorded a loss of \$19,762.50 in part due to a 'good practice' measure to cover possible allowances and staff entitlements such as long service leave and potential redundancies, enabling the organisation to include these on the balance sheet.

Despite these tougher financial times, Artback NT was able to employ 252 Indigenous artists and arts workers throughout the year, benefiting the lives of many Territorians.

It is no surprise that fundraising is a key priority for 2016 and Artback NT is more focussed on exploring possible philanthropic options to ensure the longer term future of programs. The organisation will continue to work with the Northern Territory Government and the Australia Council for the Arts whilst developing strategies to increase income from other sources.

Artback NT staff continue to operate using solid financial procedures and a high level of accountability. Records are well maintained and financial statements are provided in a timely manner well before board meetings.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Despite the uncertainty within the art sector in 2015, Artback NT delivered an extraordinary arts development and touring program with a breadth of reach and delivery unparalleled amongst arts organisations throughout the country. We continued to broaden our scope, establishing new partnerships and connections within the industry. We also significantly boosted our national reputation and achieved some incredible outcomes for NT artists as we welcomed Britt Guy into the organisation and began our producing focus.

Our Music Touring Program came to an end, which was a significant loss. It seems inconceivable considering the success that NT musicians have had recently, that the Northern Territory no longer has a dedicated Music Touring Program. Our Music Touring Manager, Vanessa Hutchins, has moved interstate and the impact of this will be felt for some time as we readjust our efforts and energies.

Alice Buscombe, our Visual Arts Manager, left midyear to return to Melbourne and we recruited Jo Foster into the role. The team successfully produced Punuku Tjukurpa, a major visual arts blockbuster and significant cultural exhibition. The staff of Neridah Stockley and Alice Buscombe supported by Robyn McLean and Jess Ong are to be congratulated on delivering such an important show.

Artback NT began to wind up its three year Indigenous Traditional Dance Program (ITDP) in Borroloola. An intensive evaluation of the three year model was completed in partnership with the Centre for Cultural Partnerships at the University of Melbourne. The evaluation is a wonderful document for the organisation and we will use it to promote our Community Cultural Development practice. The attention for ITDP's next three year engagement is on Numbulwar who have invited Artback NT into their community. However, the program is currently unfunded and we continue to look for ways to support ITDP there.

A key focus for the year was planning and we are extremely proud of our 2016 – 2020 Strategic Plan. In a time of greater funding uncertainty than normal, it is imperative that documents such as these are grounded and realistic as well as visionary maps for the organisation. We are confident our strong plan will set us up with a solid base for the future five years.

In 2015, the organisation achieved the following significant highlights:

- launched Punuku Tjukurpa at the South Australian Museum followed by successful showings at Melbourne Museum and Canberra Museum and Gallery
- built and launched the organisation's first mobile app specifically created for Punuku Tjukurpa, allowing increased access and deeper engagement for audiences
- delivered a wonderful DanceSite event in Borroloola over two nights celebrating the third year of our program there, including the creation of a new contemporary traditional dance piece
- offered Desert Mulga their first touring opportunity throughout the NT and presented The Sandridge Band's WA and NT tour travelling over 5000 kilometres without a flat tyre!
- undertook a formal dance consultation in Darwin, Katherine, Tennant Creek, Alice Springs, Borroloola and Nhulunbuy to gain an understanding of how best to support the sector. From this a program of activities has been created to address a range of key concerns.
- delivered our second reciprocal residency between Australia and Indonesia with Doni Maulistya from Cemeti Art House, Yogyakarta and Karla Dickens from New South Wales
- Artback NT's Facebook, Twitter and Instagram accounts continue to broaden our digital tootprint
- partnered with the Waralungku Art Centre to continue the monthly community markets in Borroloola and the surrounding region during the

- dry season
- continued to support the Road Safety All Stars to tour - as Indigenous community champions, they were at the forefront of delivery and advocacy for change in their communities.
- delivered the Playing Australia funded performing arts tours Sticks Stones Broken Bones and 360 Allstars throughout the Territory. These are our last interstate tours as we focus on providing opportunities for NT artists.
- presented 41 school events across the Territory
- toured Alice Springs based artist Marina Strocchi through the Territory with exhibitions and curator's talks in Tennant Creek, Katherine and Darwin
- facilitated creative developments of new Territory work and collaborations including We Three by Alice Springs based script writer Luke Alexander and Dual J [UIĀS] by Nick Power, which built on the connection established during an international residency exchange program between b*boys in Darwin and Tiny Toones in Cambodia.

Without good partnerships, arts development and touring would be made more difficult. Artback NT would like to acknowledge its major funding bodies:

2015 saw a drop in income after the huge Djuki Mala tour in 2014, however new funding areas were sourced. This diversity is essential for the organisation's financial sustainability and longer term growth. Sponsorship, donations and our fund raising strategy are a key focus for 2016.

With the office in Borroloola, together with offices in Darwin and Alice Springs, Artback NT ensures the organisation can provide representation, advocacy and promotion for NT artists throughout the Territory. We continue to play an active role in advocacy at a national level for more coordination and increased resources to service regional, remote and very remote areas.

This year, Artback NT delivered 121 program events and workshops to a total of seven locations across the Northern Territory, reaching an audience of 12,655. Outside of the Territory, Artback NT took 46 high quality program events to fifteen locations and engaged audiences of 130,050 people, bringing our Australia-wide audience to a total of 142,705 in 2015. Arts activity across the organisation's four program streams included:

Performing Arts – total of 55 program events across the NT.

Visual Arts – total of 36 program events, with 15 in the NT and 21 nationally.

Music – total of 44 program events, with 20 in the NT and 24 nationally.

Indigenous Traditional Dance – total of 32 program events, with 31 across the NT and one nationally.

None of this could have been achieved without the extremely hard work of our dedicated and passionate staff: Britt Guy, Vanessa Hutchins, Neridah Stockley, Alice Buscombe, Jo Foster, Lia Pa'apa'a, Marlene Timothy, Jess Ong and Faye McAleenan. The organisation was also fortunate to employ some wonderful contractors who supported us this year including Robyn McLean, Jacob Tolo and Jason McGann. I would also like to acknowledge our fantastic DanceSite volunteers Josh Grant and Eve Pawlik and, finally, we were delighted to have the services of an Aurora intern, Lara McArthur-Dowty, who also made an extraordinary contribution.

I would again like to acknowledge all the communities and individuals who have invited us into their neighbourhoods and worked with us in order to develop audiences and ensure a positive and meaningful experience. Thank you for your assistance and good will.

I would also like to sincerely acknowledge the hard work of Board members and I certainly appreciate the time and effort you have given to the organisation. Thank you to both the staff and the Board for your guidance and support.

THE SANDRIDGE BAND

Hailing from Borroloola, The Sandridge Band undertook the largest tour in the program's history, performing to nine remote communities and venues across the Kimberley region. The tour received an inaugural sponsorship package for flights from Airnorth and additionally was supported by NT Fleet with a troop carrier. Two 4WD troop carriers and trailer transported the band and equipment across 5000 touring kilometres, receiving great reviews and recommendations.

Desert Mulga Band relished the opportunity to tour and were mentored throughout the experience in stagecraft, media and workshop practices. The tour received major support from CAMMA Music Productions who supplied a professional sound system and Front of House Engineer.

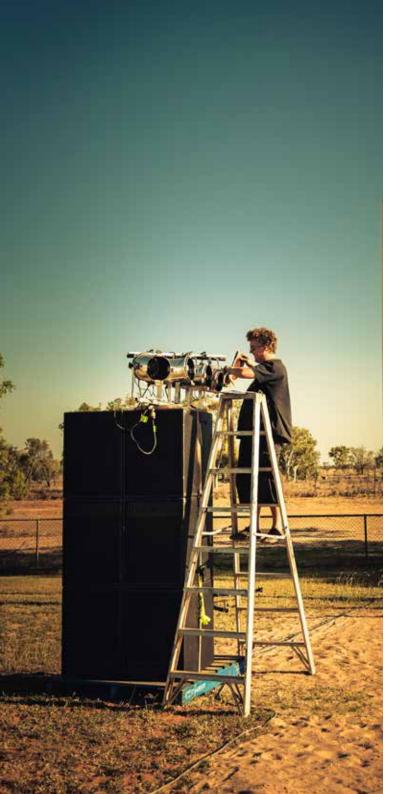

The continued development and touring of the Road Safety All Stars has been an ongoing achievement for the Music Touring Program. They were funded to attend Boyupbrook Country Music Festival in WA in February as part of a specific road safety campaign. The Road Safety All Stars were also selected to deliver a published paper as part of the 13th National Rural Health Conference held in Darwin in May. This became a feature story with ABC Local Radio's NT Country Hour program.

Artback NT would like to acknowledge and pay tribute to a founding member of the Road Safety All

Stars, Reggae Dave, who passed away in December 2015. He will be sorely missed. Vale Reggae.

The Music Touring Program spent the first days of the New Year as Tour Manager for Tjintu Desert Band at Woodford Folk Festival. This entailed six performances across two different venues and was a huge success for the band. It also provided the opportunity to meet with international festival producers from Canada regarding future festival dates for Tjintu Desert Band.

SECTOR SUDDORT

Artback NT's Music Touring Program Manager was a key mentor at Music NT's Bush Band Business and Bash, working with eight bands from the Central Australian and APY Homelands area. The Music Touring Manager also gave key workshops in Music Management and Touring and 'staying strong' - a workshop based on human choices about better lifestyle decisions including information on alcohol and drugs, domestic violence and family issues.

The Music Touring Program continued to support musicians across the Territory throughout the year. This included grant writing workshops, individual support with grant writing and serviced touring routes, venues and bands with collective information about resources, bands and activity. In addition, the program engaged with Music NT's Intune Conference, acted as a judge for Territory Song of the Year and stage managed the National Indigenous Music Awards. The program worked closely with media including ABC Darwin and Alice Springs, CAAMA Radio and 8CCC Tennant Creek and Alice Springs as both presenter and identity.

The Music Touring Program was funded and supported by Arts NT, Northern Territory Government and the Music Board, Australia Council for the Arts.

ARTBACK NT SUDDORT

The Music Touring Manager assisted Artback NT's DanceSite festival as the Technical Director and Lighting Designer. There was a close collaboration between the Music Touring Manager and Artback NT's Cultural Events Officer in Borroloola to run community markets, delivery of the National Indigenous Music Awards in Darwin and the Indigenous Economic Forum in Alice Springs.

Support was also given to the tour of *Sticks Stones Broken Bones*, to the season of *Broken* by Mary Anne Butler as Production Manager and technical support given to the Visual Arts Program in regards to the audio-visual components for the touring exhibition, *Punuku Tjukurpa*.

STICKS STONES BROKEN BONES

Artback NT kicked off the touring program this year with junk puppet theatre show Sticks Stones Broken Bones by Bunk Puppets. The tour delivered 13 performances and 12 workshops from Alice to Darwin and out to Nhulunbuy, with the majority of presenters being schools. This work reminded the organisation of how critical it is to schools to gain access to cultural experiences and fun entertainment for children and young people. This tour also acted as an informal audit of human and infrastructural resources present in communities to support the creation and delivery of art for and by young people. Four partners from this tour have been identified to work within a residency model over the next three years to develop work specifically with children and young people in mind.

GIFT OF LIFE

The highly successful *Gift of Life* was remounted for the National Rural Health Conference in Darwin followed by a short tour to Nhulunbuy and Yirrkala. Four performances were delivered over three days, which were celebrated by community and triggered important conversations. The opportunity to present at the National Rural Health Conference also allowed time to reflect on the best practice model used to deliver community messaging programs. It highlighted the strong interest from Queensland health workers, resulting in Artback NT working with a number of key partners to develop a 2016 tour in North Queensland and some vital NT communities on the way.

360 ALLSTARS

A return season of 360 Allstars enabled Artback NT to offer a strong program of workshops in the Alice Springs and Yulara region. A specific program was run with Mutitjulu-based superstars, Ninja Circus, a group of young Indigenous performers. This program created genuine exchange between Ninja Circus and 360 Allstars, which was a highlight for both groups. 360 Allstars presented a sell-out show at Araluen Art Centre to an audience predominately made up of Indigenous young people who are not regular visitors to the centre. This tour again highlighted the strength of young people as audiences and also as the next generation of NT artists.

DANCE CONSULTATION

Throughout 2015, a formal dance consultation was undertaken in Darwin, Katherine, Tennant Creek, Alice Springs, Borroloola and Nhulunbuy. Meetings were carried out with arts and community organisations who not only work in the listed towns but across their regions. The consultation was developed to gain an understanding of how to best support a sector that within the NT, lacks a peak body or a producing organisation specifically working with individual or groups. It was also an opportunity to understand what work is currently being made and what work artists would like to make in the future. From this consultation a program of activities has been created to address a range of key concerns.

WE TUREE

Luke Alexander, a scriptwriter from Alice Springs and recipient of the Northern Territory Literature Award – Brown's Mart Theatre Award, delivered a week development of his new script, We Three, with Queensland Indigenous director Jason Klarwein and dramaturg Patricia Cornelius. The week was spent with actors exploring the script for the first time and culminated in a closed industry reading.

VISUAL ARTS

2015 was a big year for the program, which celebrated the opening of a major new touring exhibition, *Punuku Tjukurpa*. Together with a comprehensive online education kit and audio descriptions, Artback NT also launched its first mobile phone app. *Punuku Tjukurpa* is an exhibition of national significance – and this mobile app highlights the creative role a very modern technology can play in showcasing an exhibition that iss full of traditional work, stories and techniques.

Closer to home, the touring exhibition *North and South* featured Alice Springs artist, Marina Strocchi and the yearly *Kerjasama* international arts residency program ensured local audiences were able to access national and international artists – in their own back yard!

DUNUKU TJUKURDA

This very special exhibition, celebrating the work of artists from Maruku Arts, opened at the South Australian Museum before travelling to Melbourne Museum and Canberra Museum and Gallery in 2015. Complemented by wonderful public programs and the development of Artback NT's first mobile app specifically for this exhibition, *Punuku Tjukurpa* has received strong audience attendance and will tour to an additional ten venues around the country until 2018.

A Lasting Impression

A new retrospective exhibition, in partnership with the Buku-Larrnggay Mulka Centre in Yirrkala, Balnhahurr takes the viewer on a visual journey, creating a platform for meaningful dialogue between Indigenous and non-Indigenous. It is a coming together of cultures and time, where audiences have the chance to learn of the Yolngu's strong tradition in artwork and how their skills, talent and creativity have transferred into print making.

Still in My Mind explores complex concepts of cultural representation, identity, place, home and memory pivoting around the Gurindji Walk Off as a seminal moment in the history of Land Rights in Australia, paying homage to the walk-off participants and their descendants within the Gurindji diaspora. Still in My Mind is curated by Brenda L Croft, an artist and PhD candidate at the University of New South Wales.

KERJASAMA | COLLABORATE

Kerjasama, or 'Collaborate', is a reciprocal visual arts residency between Indigenous Australian and Indonesian artists.

In 2015, artists Doni Maulistya (Indonesia) and Karla Dickens (Australia) undertook a joint residency in Alice Springs to develop work inspired by the unique landscape and region. Karla travelled with Vicki Bosisto from Tjanpi Desert Weavers - NPY Women's Council to engage and learn about the region, whilst Doni's residency was largely Alice Springs focused, presenting a pop-up exhibition at Watch This Space. Both artists also participated in Watch This Space's Artist Camp in the West MacDonnell Ranges and delivered an artist talk on conclusion of their residencies at Red Hot Arts.

Funded and supported by Asialink, Cemeti Art House, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australia Council for the Arts, Arts NT, Northern Territory Government, Charles Darwin University, Watch This Space and Alice Springs Town Council.







DANCESITE 2015

DanceSite 2015 was presented by Artback NT on September 18th and 19th at the Borroloola Showgrounds. This year saw a maturity of programming and an increased level of participation and ownership by the community and, for the first time, DanceSite 2015 hosted two full nights of traditional dance. All local dance groups performed over both nights, as well as visiting dance groups from Kununurra, WA and Ngukurr, NT - both performing at DanceSite for the first time. In addition, Artback NT presented the Kailani Dancers as the headline act, hailing from the small Pacific nation of Kiribati who have also seen their traditional dance and cultural practices become critically endangered. Their performance wowed and invigorated the crowd, many of whom had never seen Pacific traditional dance performed live before.

COMMUNITY BASED ITDD ACTIVITIES

To develop the activities that culminate in DanceSite events, ITDP facilitated projects throughout the year in order to develop the community and dance groups, ensuring ongoing capacity building as well as cultural maintenance. 2015 saw the continuation of existing programs including the monthly Borroloola Community Arts Markets and workshop delivery with schools and tourist groups as required. In addition, several exciting new initiatives have been delivered:

 The Li-mijimbangu (all together) traditional dance master class was developed to create a new work, bringing together the five dance groups of Borroloola. Key elders and community members from each group collaborated to create a new dance based on contemporary issues and events affecting the community. This approach allowed a shared ownership of the dances, enabling all of Borroloola's community to perform them,



as songs are historically owned by individuals who wrote them or have custodianship. They may be cared for by certain family members with the dance only taking place if these owners or custodians are present. This performing arts process and opportunity was hugely successful at engaging the community to strengthen and maintain traditional song and dance practices. The project allowed the participants to give themselves permission as leaders within the community to both write and choreograph songs and dances that were relevant to their own life experiences. As this process was done with nominated participants from all of the five local dance groups, there was a sense of community and togetherness that ITDP had not achieved

through clan-specific programming delivered in the past. Traditional dance in Borroloola is predominantly managed through the elder women (bardi bardi) of the community, resulting in little space for men to engage. However, for the Mara clan, whose leaders are men, this renewed approach allowed for there to be a recognised place for them within this process. Several young men participated heavily in the project, leading the male choreography, singing and playing the accompanying didgeridoo. This local project now has a full four part song and performance that has been performed locally with great potential and interest in being performed and toured both regionally and nationally. Furthermore, several song themes were developed as part of the process that the community are keen to continue working on post the project funding.

- As 2015 was the anticipated final year of ITDP in Borroloola, Artback NT engaged researcher Marnie Badham, from the Centre for Cultural Partnerships (CCP) at the University of Melbourne, to evaluate the program through the collection of formal interviews, informal conversations and observations at DanceSite. The documentation has been recorded and given to Artback NT staff, Borroloola community members and the Waralungku Art Centre to utilise for their programming and development processes, as well as a community archive. The final evaluation is an important and thorough document for the organisation outlining ITDP's three-year community arts and cultural development (CACD) process.
- In 2015 Artback NT engaged with the Borroloola community across its other programming for the first time. The Performing Arts Program toured Sticks Stones Broken Bones, a children's puppet show to approximately 40 people at the Borroloola Community Arts Markets, providing an exciting opportunity for locals to experience an art form that many had not seen before. Additionally, the Music Program successfully presented and toured local Borroloola band The Sandridge Band across the top end of NT and WA.

Artback NT is extremely pleased to be able to continue its work in Borroloola post March 2016 when the initial funding concludes. Artback NT recognises the value of the ITDP Borroloola framework, one that showcases a collaborative

community model of arts and cultural engagement, which the organisation intends to continue growing and developing for new communities in the future.

Artback NT is now in initial consultations with the community of Numbulwar, 550 kilometres north of

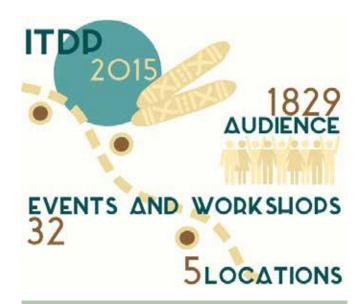

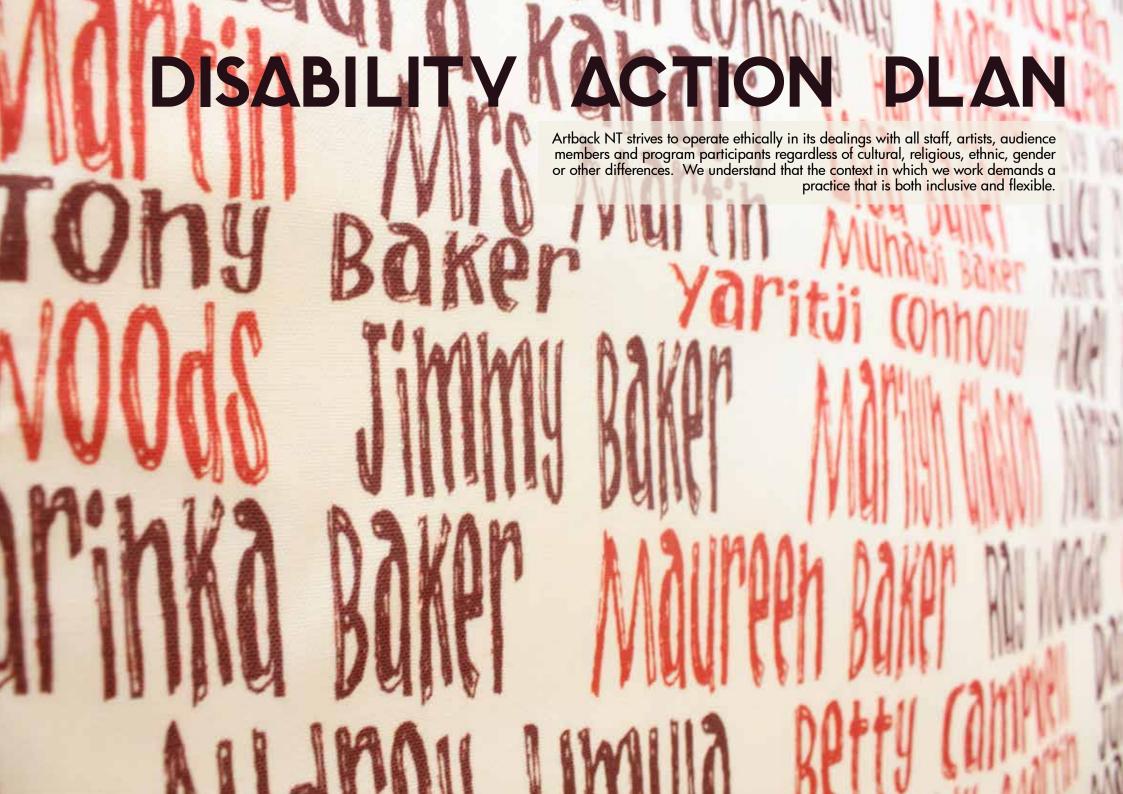

In 2015 Artback NT delivered 121 program events and workshops to a total of seven locations across the Northern Territory, reaching an audience of 12,655. Outside of the Territory, Artback NT took forty-six high quality program events to fifteen locations and engaged audiences of 130,050 people, bringing Artback's Australia-wide audience to a total of 142,705 in 2015. Arts activity across the organisation's four program streams included:

- Performing Arts total of 55 program events across the NT
- Visual Arts total of 36 program events, with 15 in the NT and 21 nationally
- Music total of 44 program events, with 20 in the NT and 24 nationally
- Indigenous Traditional Dance total of 32 program events, with 31 across the NT and one nationally

Artback NT also

- presented 41 school events across the Territory
- delivered the third DanceSite event in Borroloola to a rapturous audience of over 1,000 community members
- launched the incredible Punuku Tjukurpa exhibition that has now been seen by audiences of over 115,000 nationally with another two years of touring across three states and one territory to go
- built and launched the organisation's first mobile app specifically for Punuku Tjukurpa, allowing increased access and deeper engagement for audiences
- delivered the first stage development of Dual | U.F.19, building on the connection established through an international residency exchange program between b*boys in Darwin, Australia and Phnom Penh, Cambodia.

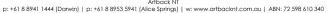

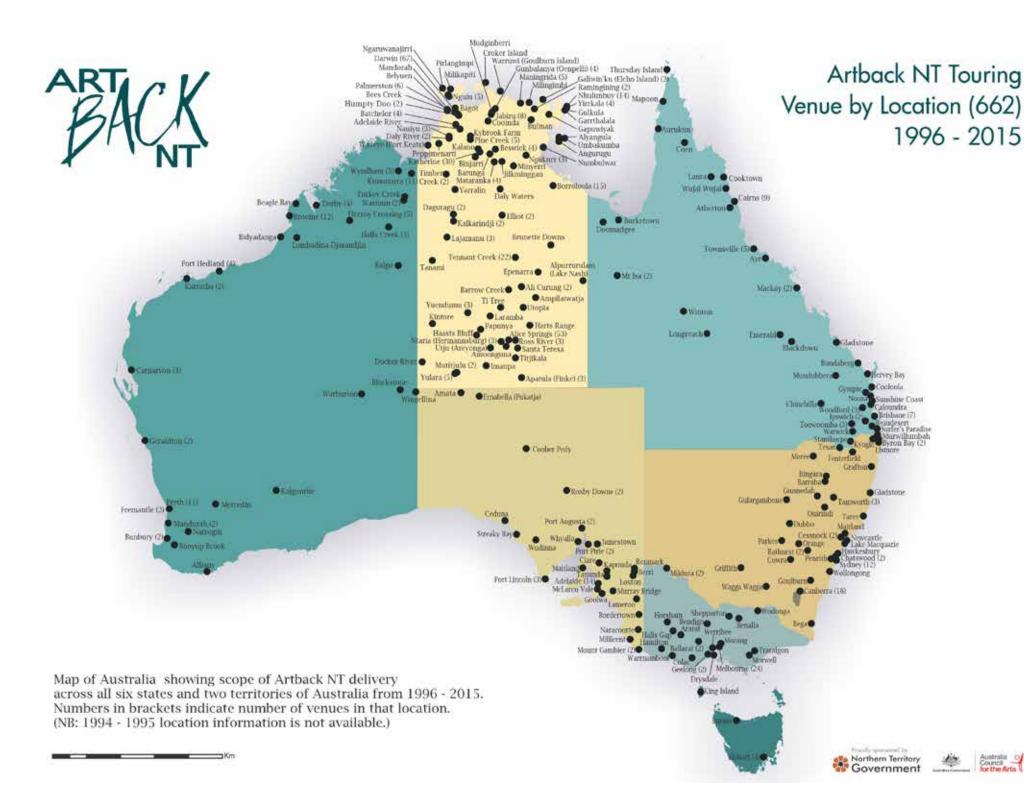

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 December 2015

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

Reporting Entity

The association is not a reporting entity because in the committee's opinion there are unlikely to exist users who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs, and these accounts are therefore "special purpose accounts" that have been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Constitution and the Associations Act.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless stated.

The Profit and loss Statements and Balance Sheet have been prepared on an accrual basis and are in accordance with historical cost convention. Except where stated no allowance is made for the effect of changing prices on the results or the financial position.

Revenues and Expenses in the association are recognised in the Profit and Loss Statements when and only when the flow or consumption or loss of economic benefits has occurred and can be easily measured.

a) Taxation

The Association believes it is exempt from all forms of taxation except PAYG and GST. Revenues and expenses are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

These financial statements are audited. They must be read in conjunction with the attached Audit Report and Notes which form part of these financial statements.

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I. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Contd)

b) Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for employee entitlements benefits accumulated as a result of employees rendering services up to the reporting date. These benefits include salaries and annual leave.

Liabilities arising in respect of salaries, annual leave and any other employee entitlements expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are measured at their nominal amounts and are shown under current liabilities. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

c) Acquisition of Assets

Assets are recorded at cost on acquisition except as stated below. The cost of acquisition includes the fair value of assets transferred in exchange.

Assets acquired at no cost, or for nominal consideration, are initially recognised as, assets and revenues at their fair value at the date of acquisition, except where they are acquired as part of a transfer of functions from another Government entity, in which case they are recognised as contributed equity at the carrying amount

d) Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

Depreciation is provided on a Diminishing and Straight line basis on property plant and equipment at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation less estimated residual value at the end for the useful lives of the assets against revenue over those estimated lives to the association.

e) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the association reviews the carrying values of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

f) Terms Conditions and Accounting Policies

Financial Assets

Cash at Bank

Deposits are recognised at their nominal amounts. Interest is credited to revenue as it accrues.

Cash Management

Deposits are recognised at their nominal amounts. Interest is credited to revenue as it accrues.

Receivables

These receivables are recognised at the nominal amounts due less any provision for bad and doubtful debts.

Financial Liabilities

Trade Creditors

Creditors and accruals are recognised at their nominal amounts, being the amount at which liabilities will be settled. Liabilities are recognised to the extent that the goods and services have been received (and irrespective of having been invoiced).

g) Unexpended Grants

The grants funds have been received for specific purpose. To the extent that the funds have not been applied for that purpose throughout the year, they are recorded as unexpended grants and are recognised as a current liability.
